ONBOARD COVID TESTING

All students are expected to test at home before returning to campus for the semester and participate in oncampus PCR onboard testing. Onboarding testing will include a PCR test upon arrival, followed by two PCR tests per week (on non-consecutive days) for the first two weeks.

Rapid antigen tests will be available all semester at both Campus Safety and Wellbeing offices, the Wellness Center, and Health Services. Asymptomatic PCR testing will not be available after onboard testing ends. Symptomatic PCR testing is available for students at Health Services. LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

As we welcome you to Hampshire College, we want to take this opportunity to invite you to think actively, critically, and with deep curiosity about the living land and waters that were here before Hampshire College existed and before it was cultivated apple orchards and farmland. I'd like to begin this event by acknowledging that we stand on Nonotuck (NON-NO-TUCK) land and also acknowledge our neighboring Indigenous nations: the Nipmuc (NIP-MUCK) and the Wampanoag (WAHM-PUH-NOG) to the East, the Mohegan (MO-HE-GAN) and Pequot (PEA-KWAHT) to the South, the Mohican (MO-HE-KN) to the West, and the Abenaki (A-BUH-NAA-KEE) to the North.

When English colonists first arrived in Kwinitekw (KWIN-IH-TEK-WUH) or the Connecticut River Valley, they used the Algonkian terms of places for the names of indigenous groups. The region west of this campus lies the Connecticut River which forms a large U-shaped oxbow. Around the midpoint of this geographical feature was called *Nonotuck* and roughly translates to "the middle of the river" or the "far away land."

The Nonotuck people lived on what is now Hadley, Northampton, and much of the land eastward, which is now called Pelham. Intertribal wars spurred by English and Dutch settlers, exposure to smallpox and other diseases, and colonial violence forcibly removed these indigenous people from their stewardship of the land. Surviving Nonotuck folded in with Abenaki people throughout Northern New England and Southern Quebec and many have family connections with current Kwinitekw residents.

As an active first step toward decolonization, we encourage you to learn more about the Native nations whose homelands you now reside on and the Indigenous homelands on which you live, study, and work. We also invite you to deepen your relationship to these living lands and waters as guests on this land and members of our collective community.

This acknowledgment is a compiled offering of words, ideas, and history by John Wildman, director of Student Affairs, from the following, and to each, I express gratitude for their work and example: a workshop titled "Acknowledging The Land: A community Conversation on Stewarding Relationships" held at Hampshire College in November 2022 by recent graduates Blythe Wilde 18F, Isabella Uttley Rosado 18F, and Fianna Wilde 18F, Margaret Bruchac's chapter titled "Native Presence in Nonotuck and Northampton" in the book A *Place Called Paradise: Culture and Community in Northampton, Massachusetts, 1654-2004*, as well as land acknowledgments from UMass, Mount Holyoke College, R.W. Kern Center (Claire Schillington 15F), Teal Van Dyke 06F, and Bixie Ustler and Ian Miller's Statement on the Indigenous Heritage of the Land on which Amherst College and the Five Colleges reside.
