FOREIGN STUDENTS NEWSLETTER As most of you know, this newsletter appears once a month. It includes upcoming events in the Five Colleges, interviews, articles and other information of interest to foreign and international students. As a college newsletter, it is completely dependent on what you contribute to it; anything is welcome: writings about your country or about your culture shock on arriving in the U.S. are particularly welcome, but also interviews, concerns you have, drawings (in black pencil), whatever. You are more than welcome to work with me in producing this newsletter, so we can make it a bit more professional this year.

What is the difference between foreign and international students? It's basically a distinction made by Admissions, not by us. A foreign student holds a foreign passport and mostly came straight from their homeland to Hampshire. An international student is anybody else who has lived abroad for a long time and therefore has had the same experiences that bind the members of the Foreign Student Organization. For FSO, it really does not matter on which list you are.

The FSO consists of about 90 members, and is connected to FSA, i.e. Foreign Students Advising. At least for the time being, FSO has three representatives, elected last semester: Yasmina, Maxi and Sandy. They will represent ours interests at meetings with the Administration, Community Council etc., if necessary, and organize FSO meetings.

The FSO is intended to share cultures and friendships, both with other foreign students and the rest of the community. This year we will organize academic events, such as lectures, a Chinese New Year Celebration, films, workshops, and social events, such as potluck dinners, parties, a Dutch Santa Claus Feast, and trips. Some of the social events will be for FSO as a group, but most events, especially the academic ones, will be for the whole community. If you want to organize anything that can reduce the ignorance of your country or area on campus, FSO or FSA can probably sponsor it. Contact any of the representatives or any of the FSA staff members for questions or suggestions. To make ourselves more known to the campus, we are especially in need of campus events.

Those Foreign Student Advising student workers are: Kien, Susanna, Abbas, Nahela, Yasmina and me. We work for the Foreign Student Advisor, Barbara Orr-Wise, as student advisors, organizers of events, and assistants to FSO and FSA. By the time you read this, our office should be ready, but then again, it should have been ready a month ago... WHEN it is ready, it will be in the Dakin K-basement. It will be an advising center (on campus issues, immigration, field studies, etc.), a meeting place and a place where you can work on organizing FSO events. We will let you know soon about our office hours. Drop in sometime if you have questions, problems, frustration or if you want a cup of tea. More about the FSO in the next newsletter!

Last semester, the FSO addressed some of their major concerns to the community. The problems concerned mostly financial aid, and had to do with the decreasing number of foreign students at Hampshire College. Financial Aid had been reducing the number of grants to foreign students with a rate of about 10% per year, and seemed unwilling to stop this. We wrote letters to the administration, the trustees, community council, pretty much to everybody. I met with the trustees and community council, and Sandy wrote a proposal on how workstudy opportunities on campus could be improved.

In reaction to this, a staff meeting was held this June: Present were "our own" Barabara Orr-Wise, Carmen Fortin of Admissions, Jane McGowan of Student Employment, Kathy Methot of Financial Aid and Bobbi Stuart of Central Records (who deals with immigration matters). Addressed were problems with the Admission of foreign students (the scholarships for foreign students are merit scholarships, i.e. based on academic abilities), career counseling services and workstudy. The problem of the decreasing financial aid as such does not seem to have been discussed, and was therefore not solved (unlike rumors had it, unfortunately).

Several policy changes were agreed to:

- 1. Carmen would discuss with the Admission's staff the possibility of establishing a faculty committee to review foreign student applicants for scholarly achievements in consideration of awarding financial aid.
- Financial Aid and Student Employment would expand current opportunities where foreign students without financial aid could work to include: Saga (was already open), Physical Plant, the daycare, bookstore, bar, farm center, multi-sports snack facility, special programs, and would continue to review exceptions/exemptions on particular cases. Normally no students can work on campus if they have no financial aid, but since foreign students are not allowed to work off campus, an exception to the rule was necessary.
- 3. The Foreign Student Advising staff would be expanded from three to six, also open for non-workstudy.
- 4. Andrea Wright will coordinate the Host Family Program (she already did a good job this summer!), and would look at ways to improve counseling for third and fourth year foreign students.
- 5. This group of staff will meat at least once a month during the academic year to enhance communication flow and to review services offered. Hopefully financial aid will be on the agenda next time.

Well, at least something has been changed, and we're very happy with that. FSO might continue to pressure for financial aid changes, in order to keep its group alive. The only reason we still had quite a good number of new foreign students (13) was the unusually high acceptance rate. You can read more about this in last year's issues in our office.
