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Hampshire Wraps Up Successful Fundraising Year With Support from Alumni and Parents

Hampshire College had a very successful fundraising year, which closed on June 30, thanks to the generous support of over 4,000 donors. The College set records for alumni participation, and doubled giving to more than \$10 million in gifts and grants, which supported emerging priorities in creativity, sustainability, and entrepreneurship. Over 2,500 alums donated to Hampshire this year, an increase of more than 400 from last year, and alum participation rose from 26% to 29%.

The Hampshire Fund, which supports faculty salaries, financial aid, and physical plant improvements, increased by 8% to \$1.75M in valuable unrestricted support. Hampshire celebrated the forth year of the Graduate Gift Challenge, which encourages graduating students to make their first gift back to Hampshire, and a record 259 members of the 2012 graduates made a gift to the College. Graduates from the youngest four years continue to support Hampshire at significantly higher rates than national trends for alumni participation.




The strength in fundraising was cited by Moody's investment services, which voted to improve Hampshire's bond rating due to the College's well-defined market niche, solid operating performance, and strong giving results.





Hampshire College was awarded a grant for \$250,000 from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation for a proposal entitled *Developing Hampshire College into a Language Learning Community: Enriching the Sciences, Deepening the Humanities*. This grant will be used over a period of two years to support language instruction in the humanities and sciences.

Associate Professor of Anthropology Michelle Bigenho was awarded a grant for \$36,403 from the National Science Foundation for a project entitled *Workshop on Cultural Property, Creativity, and Indigeneity Under the New Bolivian Constitution*. A team of researchers from the United States, the United Kingdom and Bolivia will conduct an interactive workshop in Bolivia to discuss cultural property and heritage under this country's new constitution. They will facilitate critical discussions with Bolivians about intellectual property and heritage, and these discussions and lectures will be summarized in textual form through a Spanish-English bilingual website.

In recognition of the 20th anniversary of the James Baldwin Scholars program, **Hildy Gottlieb Hill 72F** and Hampshire parents Maureen A. Kennedy and Mr. Konrad S. Alt P11 made major gifts in support of the Baldwin Scholars endowment



fund. The Baldwin program provides scholarships to talented students from underserved communities who would benefit from a transition year before college in which to improve general academic skills and prepare for the rigor of college studies. Hampshire will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the program, as a part of Family, Alumni, and Friends Weekend, with an academic symposium and celebration on October 13 and 14. Hampshire Launches Scholarship Fund for Undocumented Immigrant Students

A new scholarship and endowment at Hampshire College has been created to provide upwards of \$25,000 in financial aid per year to assist students with undocumented immigrant citizenship status who have been accepted into Hampshire. The endowment is funded solely through gifts from private donors who wish to support students who were brought to this country as babies or young children, who have attended U.S. schools, and who wish to continue their educations but are ineligible for federal financial aid.

"Many of us who went to college in the post-World War II boom went on full scholarships. All financial aid was need-based. Increasingly that's not true anymore," said sociology professor Margaret Cerullo (pictured right), who was influential in creating the scholarship. "For a lot of us, access to higher education is a deep principle."


Professor Cerullo credits student work as an inspiration that made her see the need for the funding to address what she considers a social injustice. Her student Jamie Blair's Division III (senior) project work with undocumented students advocating passage of the DREAM act captured her interest. Cerullo spent much of the past spring working with Hampshire's college advancement office on a proposal for a new funding source.



"We raised money from alums, prior donors, parents, and the graduating class. We asked students to dedicate their graduate gift to the undocumented student fund. We tried to raise money on every front we could," said Cerullo. "We wanted funding not for one year, but ongoing to ensure access for undocumented students." A \$250,000 gift further expanded the fund. With current funding over \$300,000, the endowment can now support one student every four years. The goal is to raise additional funds to establish an endowment sufficient to help an undocumented student attend Hampshire each year.
