

Two exciting challenges inspire Hampshire Fund giving before the end of the 2012 calendar year


Alum Challenge: 1,000 by Dec. 31

An anonymous 1977 alum has pledged a generous \$30,000 contribution to the Hampshire Fund if 1,000 alums make gifts of any amount by December 31. As of December 18, we have received 756 gifts, with 244 more to go before the end of the calendar year.

New parents simply need to make a gift to have their contribution count; parents who gave last year must increase what they gave in the last academic year in order to count for the challenge.

Hampshire Launches Alumni Cuba Trips

This January, Hampshire faculty members will lead two trips to Havana for alumni, parents, and friends. Both trips will have 20 participants, and each filled up within only a few days of being advertised. Drawing on the close contacts made during our unique 12-year-old Study Abroad Program in Havana, run in conjunction with the Union of Writers and Artists of Cuba (UNEAC), participants will meet with sociologists, musicians, visual artists, architects and planners, filmmakers, and dancers for discussions and performances. All those leading the tours, workshops, and discussions are members of UNEAC and have worked closely with Hampshire faculty and students since the founding of the program. **Trip 1: January 6—14, 2013**, *Contemporary Cuban Society*, led by Hampshire professors Carollee Bengelsdorf and Margaret Cerullo.

Trip 2: January 12—20, 2013: *Contemporary Cuban Visual Arts and Architecture,* led by Professor Jacqueline Hayden and artist and publisher Steven Daiber.
