LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

We want to begin by naming that we are on unceded Pocumtuc land. We understand that naming this is not enough - we're doing this as a way of acknowledging and reminding ourselves about the land we occupy, and we know this act alone does not repair the damage done by colonialism. We want to acknowledge the Pocumtuc people, the original inhabitants of the land where we live and work, and the land that Hampshire College is on.

This land spans from what is currently known as Hampden and Hampshire Counties into Connecticut and southern Vermont. While there are still individuals with Pocumtuc ancestry here, the Pocumtuc people, as a tribe, are no longer here because of the ongoing violence at the hands of European Colonization. We'd also like to name the neighboring indigenous nations: the Nipmuc and the Wampanoag to the east, the Mohegan and Pequot to the South, the Mohican and Nonotuck to the west, and the Abenaki to the North.

> What can we do individually and collectively to repair the harm done by settler colonialism? How can we build a right relationship with this land we have settled on?

All first year and transfer students are required to read Daniel Immerwahr's To Hide an Empire. Immerwahr explores the history of how the United States came to define itself, and the peculiar way U.S. political and military officials pursued empire building projects. By using a range of evidence, including historical maps, fictional novels, folklore, biographical narratives and archival evidence, Immerwahr explores how U.S. authorities came to define geographic areas as territories, or as having commonwealth status and what this meant for questions of sovereignty, citizenship and the relationship between race and empire. We ask incoming students to focus on the first half of the book which contains a compelling analysis of the technologies and cultures of imperialism that developed during and after the Spanish American War of 1898.

Please read the "Introduction: Looking Beyond the Logo Map," chapters 1-11 and the "Conclusion: Enduring Empire." As you read the range of examples Immerwahr examines, please select some cultural artifact, writer, political or resistance leader that you find particularly striking. Perhaps you will pick an author with which you are already familiar. Think about how Immerwahr portrays this figure or cultural material in a new light. Express your thoughts in a creative or written form, so that you can draw on it during orientation. You will have an opportunity to discuss this book with your peers during orientation.
